more. Pianist Aaron Diehl's 2023 recording of Zodiac Suite,

performed alongside New York City-based orchestra The Knights, was nominated for Best Classical Compendium at the 2024 GRAMMY awards.

Diehl dedicated himself to restoring Williams' *Zodiac Suite* after his encounter with her former manager and Executive Director of the Mary Lou Williams Foundation, Father Peter O'Brien. O'Brien was a tireless advocate for Williams, and his death in 2015 left many planned projects with her music unrealized. Diehl was inspired by O'Brien's passion to delve further into Williams' music, eventually focusing his efforts on her unfinished "Zodiac Suite." Using the first iteration on Asch Records as a framework, recorded in 1945, Diehl assembled the "Zodiac Suite" arrangement audiences will hear on May 19.

> "Williams was determined to be taken seriously, to not be pigeonholed as a novelty," **Diehl** said. "As a Black woman whose career spanned much of the 20th century, she needed to sidestep the hackneyed tropes and caricatures surrounding gender and race in the music industry; in her mind, she was simply a pianist and composer, and those were enough descriptors."

Through the "Zodiac Suite" project and subsequent performances, Diehl hopes to generate more awareness for Williams as a composer and pianist. Her hundreds of arrangements and compositions demonstrate her ability to adapt as jazz music pushed forward. Likewise, her own music, along with her mentorship to Thelonious Monk, Charlie Parker, Miles Davis, Tadd Dameron, Bud Powell, and Dizzy Gillespie shaped the jazz genre for years to come. Diehl views Williams' "Zodiac Suite" as a testament to her resilience and a reminder to continue celebrating her legacy.

In 1945, pianist and composer Mary Lou Williams finalized and first performed her tour de force orchestral *Zodiac Suite*, 12 pieces based on the astrological signs from Aries to Pisces, dedicated to jazz greats of her era born under the signs, including Billie Holliday, Dizzy Gillespie, Ethel Waters, Thelonious Monk, Café Society owner Barney Josephson, and more. Williams debuted her celestial odyssey in a piano trio format, then arranged the work for chamber-jazz ensemble, and performed a recomposition with full orchestra at Carnegie Hall, yet the full suite was never performed during her lifetime. Pianist Aaron Diehl has devoted considerable energy to restoring Williams's original orchestrations, first for the New York Philharmonic during pandemic lockdown, and then live with the Philadelphia Orchestra in spring 2023. Washington Performing Arts presents the Aaron Diehl Trio, The United States Air Force Band, and other works for a one-night concert event and D.C. premiere of Williams's *Zodiac Suite* as she imagined it.

ABOUT AARON DIEHL

Pianist Aaron Diehl has quietly re-defined the lines between jazz and classical, and built a global career around his nuanced, understated approach to music-making. Praised for his "melodic precision, harmonic erudition, and elegant restraint" (*The New York Times*), and his "traditional jazz sound with a sophisticated contemporary spin" (*The Guardian*), Diehl has performed with musical giants such as Wynton Marsalis, Cécile McLorin Salvant, Tyshawn Sorey, and Philip Glass, and has been a soloist with the New York Philharmonic, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the San Francisco Symphony, and the Cleveland Orchestra, working with conductors like Yannick Nézet-Séguin, Marin Alsop, and Alan Gilbert. In 2023, Diehl was named as the Artistic Director of 92NY's Jazz in July Festival, succeeding the legendary Bill Charlap.
